The program will use a blended delivery approach of on-line coursework, and on-site course/lab work on Guam, which will be enhanced by integrated field experiences coordinated throughout the academic program. The first online course will start in August 2015.

Candidates for Project EPICS must meet the following criteria to be considered for the program:

- 1. Commited to providing speech/language services to students in your home island.
- Completed a bachelor's degree in any field and demonstrate evidence of interest in the field of Communicative Disorders;
- 3. Be bilingual; speaking English and an indigenous Pacific Language with some level of proficiency as determined by the selection committee;
- Have good written and oral communication skills as determined by the selection committee through an interview and written essay;
- Have an accumulated grade point average of 3.0 in undergraduate coursework;
- 6. Completed the basic science requirements set by the American Speech and Hearing Association (ASHA); and
- 7. Be willing to participate in non-traditional training formats.
